Making climate finance work for women:

Overview of bilateral ODA to gender and climate change

his brief is a contribution to the 22nd Conference of the Parties to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (COP22) and a submission of recommendations for the renewal of the Lima Work Programme on Gender.¹ It provides an overview of how members of the OECD Development Assistance Committee (DAC)² are integrating gender equality into their bilateral ODA to climate change and makes recommendations to improve the gender-responsiveness of climate action.³

KEY FINDINGS


- Climate ODA that also supports the achievement of gender equality accounted for 31% of bilateral ODA to climate change in 2014 – a total of USD 8 billion. Just 3% had gender equality as a principal objective, while 28% integrated gender equality as a secondary objective.
- Gender equality is better integrated in adaptation than in mitigation activities. In 2014, 46% of bilateral ODA to adaptation only targeted gender equality, compared with 28% to mitigation only.
- Attention to gender equality is uneven across climate-related sectors. While gender equality is
 quite well integrated in climate-related aid to agriculture and water, it is poorly addressed in economic
 infrastructure sectors. In 2013-14, only 8% of climate-related aid to energy targeted gender equality.
- 4. Donors should improve their support to locally-led action on gender and climate change through multi-year and predictable funding for southern civil society organisations, including women's rights organisations. Only 2% of all gender-responsive climate aid went to southern civil society organisations in 2014, representing USD 132 million.
- More needs to be done to improve women's opportunities to participate in the green economy, notably through ensuring that women benefit equally from development projects focusing on clean technology and renewable energy.

However, we need more direct feminist funding and resourcing.




Who are we?

FRIDA provides young feminist organizers with the resources they need to amplify their voices and bring attention to the social justice issues they care about. We enable the support, flexibility and networks to sustain young feminist visions.

- FRIDA has been grantmaking since 2010
- We use a participatory approach to grantmaking because we believe that the young feminists in various regions know best what their region needs

FRIDA Grantee Partners

- We currently have 245 grantee partners. WE fund groups in the Global South, split into 6 regions:
 - SSA/WESCA
 - South, Southeast, East Asia and The Pacific
- MENA
 - Central Eastern Europe, Caucasus & Central Asia
 - Caribbean
 - Latin America
- FRIDA's GPs work on different thematic areas that are often intersectional & always self defined :
 - CEJ (20 groups currently with most in Latin America & Asia- Pacific)
 - Gender based violence
 - LGBTQI rights
 - sex work
 - Others self defined by feminists

WHY PARTICIPATORY?




- Change the power dynamic of who decides about money.
- Value the expertise of people working on the ground and trust that they are the experts in their context
- Move accountability of funders to movements and movements to each other.
- Collectively decide about resources, especially when they are scarce.
- Learn about our movements: what is being done and what is needed

Movements moving resources!

→ Small, emerging grassroots groups with little or no access to funding from larger donors led by young feminist activists.

WIIV CAILALL

- → Groups, networks, or collectives based in Africa, Southeast, East Asia and the Pacific, The Middle East, Latin America and the Caribbean and Central, Southern, Eastern Europe and Central and North Asia.
- → Groups located in remote, underserved areas.
- → Groups that are made up of and/or working with socially excluded young women, trans* and intersex youth, especially: refugees, ethnic, national and caste minorities, rural women, urban disadvantaged, lesbian, bisexual, trans*, women and trans* living with HIV and AIDS, sex workers, women and trans* with disabilities, women and trans* living or working in armed conflicts and post conflict zones, women and trans lead unions, groups working on climate justice, land rights.
- → Groups using creative and innovative strategies to further their activism (including art, music, culture, poetry, social media, feminist activist driven research etc.)





WHAT FRIDA CAN'T SUPPORT AT THE MOMENT

- ➤ Groups with budgets over \$50,000 USD.
- Proposals submitted by individuals, government
 institutions, political organizations or religious groups.
- Groups that focus only on the provision of direct services (e.g. community literacy, formal education, technical training, craft or health care etc).
- Groups that focus only on income generating activities.
- Groups based in highly-industrialized countries.
- Groups led by cis* men.
- Groups led women and trans* and intersex people over 30.

WHO WE ARE

Urgent Action Fund for Women's Human Rights is a feminist fund that protects, strengthens and sustains women and transgender human rights defenders at critical moments.

We intervene quickly when activists are poised to make great gains or face serious threats to their lives and work.

Types of technical assistance



- Decision-making tools and/or information provision
- Technology identification and prioritization
- Feasibility of technology options
- Piloting and deployment of technologies in local conditions
- Private sector engagement and market creation
- Financing facilitation

Or a combination of the above







Global technology matchmaking



- Key stakeholders (local governments, civil society, academic/research institutions, private sector) convey technology requests to their NDEs
- National Designated Entities (NDEs), each country's representative for climate technologies, reviews and coordinate requests
- CTCN proposes a plan and identifies the most relevant technology experts from its global Network and to implement it
- The Network (550+ academic, civil society, finance, private sector and research institutions) who are contracted to provide technology assistance



Capacity Building

- Support for the Women and Gender Constituency Gender-Just Solutions Awards & collaboration on up-scaling workshops
- Training on a broad range of sectors
- Support for civil society, entrepreneurs & social entrepreneurs
- Assistance with developing funding proposals (GCF concept notes, private financing, etc.)



- Need to be endorsed by the national focal points to the Adaptation Fund (Designated Authority) and the CTCN (National Designated Entity, NDE)





Submission of technology concepts (Short description of the requested technologies)

- 3-time opportunities to submit a technology concept $\rightarrow Now 2^{nd}$ call is open
- Development and submission of the technology concept
 - Download of the application template via the programme webpage (English, Spanish and French)
 - Development of the application in consultation with the national focal points to the Adaptation Fund (Designated Authority) and the CTCN (NDE)
 - Endorsement from the national focal points prior to official submission via the programme webpage
