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About us


The Women and Gender Constituency (WGC) is one of the nine stakeholder groups of the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC). Established in 2009 and granted full constituency status in 2011, the WGC consists

of 52 women's and environmental civil society organizations, who are working together to ensure that women's voices are heard and their rights prioritized in the fight against climate change.



The Women and Gender Constituency, consisting of a broad variety of national and regional network organizations, represents hundreds and thousands of people across the globe, with advocates from over 90 countries.

Our Background

Since the Earth Summit in 1992, the United Nations has been working with governments and civil society to tackle one of the greatest challenges the planet has faced; climate change. At the summit, the Member States of the UN agreed to a new convention on climate change; a non-legally binding international treaty. The convention provided a new framework through which nations could work together to agree on limiting emissions of greenhouse gases, those which cause climate change, principally carbon dioxide. This UN Framework Convention on Climate Change, or UNFCCC, is an evolving commitment that develops through the ongoing discussions and agreements of governments around the world. There

are now around 1,400 such organizations observing the annual conferences, and many have grouped themselves into constituencies.

These constituencies provide focal points for easier interaction with the UNFCCC Secretariat, based in Bonn, and individual governments. There are currently nine constituencies, and they are broadly grouped by the type of organizations they represent: businesses and industry organizations, environmental organizations, local and municipal authorities, trade unions, research and independent organizations, and organizations that work for the rights of Capitalise Indigenous People, young people, agricultural workers, and women and gender rights organizations.

Our Goals

The WGC promotes human rights and gender equality and the full and effective participation of women at all levels of decision making, as well as a gender responsive approach in all policies and measures related to climate change. The WGC provides a voice to women to formalize and unify the perspectives of women and gender civil society organizations active in the UNFCCC processes.

We provide a space for the Constituency members to raise their concerns and suggest priority actions,

and together formulate democratically shared positions, which we strengthen and promote.

The Constituency aims to further expand its outreach and engagement with various groups and unify a global movement demanding climate justice. We want to ensure that global commitments embrace gender equality and women's rights, especially with relation to climate change through UNFCCC conventions, and the 2030 Sustainable Development Goals.

Our Principles

WGC members work to promote full realization of the human rights of women and girls through specific goal-oriented, clear and measurable purposes and objectives. The Constituency embraces principles of democratic and participatory governance, ensuring respectful collaboration between members, especially of diverging positions. Providing a platform for women's leadership with broad and participatory access, procedures of the WGC are transparent, timely and flexible, further facilitating the potential for wide and inclusive membership. The WGC also emphasizes an equitable approach to representation, affiliation, age, and ability, encouraging members to build on our collective and individual history. As an official stakeholder body of the UNFCCC, the WGC also strives to mentor the younger generation and newcomers to the movement and the Constituency.

Solutions Award

The Women and Gender Constituency, along with other women, gender, and human rights advocates, has been actively pushing world leaders to ensure just and equitable climate policies that put respect for people's rights and the integrity of the planet first, while responding to injustice among and within countries in relation to climate impacts and resilience.

We know the solutions to a more sustainable future already exist – and it is time to upscale them far and wide, and demand change!

As we focus on implementing the Paris Agreement, the Gender Just Climate Solutions showcased in this publication provide concrete examples on how to center gender equality and women's rights in climate action. The Gender Just Climate Solutions Award comprises three categories:

- 1 **Technical Solutions**
- 2 **Non-Technical Solutions**
- 3 **Transformational Solutions**

We received 343 eligible applications.



The selection process was based on the following criteria:

1. Provides equal access to benefits for women, men and youth.
2. Aims to alleviate and/or does not add additional burden to women's workload (such as via additional natural resource management or care responsibilities without compensation).
3. Empowers women through better mobility/ accessibility, enhanced livelihood security, enhanced food security, improved health, access to safe water, etc. (as many benefits as possible).
4. Promotes women's democratic rights and participation by ensuring decision-making by local women, men, women's groups, cooperatives and communities.
5. Is locally led and/or locally driven (decentralised and appropriate).
6. Ensures self-sufficiency and a low input of resources (safe, affordable and sustainable).
7. Contributes to climate change mitigation, emissions reduction and/or climate adaptation (the project is sustainable).
8. Results can be shared, spread and scaled up (replicable elsewhere, not just benefiting one individual).
9. Shows interlinkages to cross-cutting issues, such as (including, but not restricted to) peace-building, natural resources management, food security and/or health, water and sanitation.

Name of the project • **Awesome Blossoms: empowering women and girls to ensure a sustainable future**

Description of the project • Awesome Blossoms is an initiative by the community-based organization Safe Spaces that transforms urban farming in the Mathare informal settlement, Nairobi. With 500 organic, water-efficient gardens, the project empowers 75 women and supports girls' education through partnerships with three local primary schools. Awesome Blossoms provides nutritious and organic vegetables grown with minimal water and land, fosters environmental education, and promotes women's micro-entrepreneurship. Having surpassed initial goals, the project now aims to acquire land for vertical farming systems, further enhancing sustainability and impact.

Transformative Results

- 500 hydroponic gardens planted in 3 school farms to grow organic, nutritious vegetables for school lunches and sales, educating pupils.
- 75 community women micro-entrepreneurs growing and selling organic produce, financial management, and sales.
- 45 peer educators trained in organic farming, sales/marketing, organizational skills.
- Revenues from sales support girls' education, skills training, and sports programs.
- Used an "each one teaches one" methodology involving peer educators passing on knowledge to entrepreneurs and community members.
- Created a sustainable model to be replicated in other cities and informal settlements expanding beneficiaries and food resources.

Tajik mountain women leading the solar energy just transition

Description of the project

In the remote Yagnob Valley of Tajikistan, The Little Earth supports mountain-dwelling women to break isolation and implement a just energy transition. 40 women from 11 villages, who rely on kerosene and firewood, have been trained to use and maintain solar devices and resource efficient technologies. This shift reduces environmental degradation in fragile ecosystems and improves communities' health and safety by eliminating harmful fumes. By strengthening women's technical skills, easing their unpaid workload, and integrating them into decision-making at local and national levels, the initiative promotes gender equality while opening new opportunities for income and leadership.

Transformative Results

Solar systems reduce CO₂ emissions by up to 3 tons per year per household.

Contributes to the global goal of tripled renewable energy capacity, focusing on out of grid communities.

Protects ecosystems, preventing soil erosion and conserving biodiversity in the Yagnob National Natural-Ethnographic Park.

The focus on low-cost, easy-to-operate technologies ensures affordability and accessibility, making it a sustainable model for other remote communities.

The decentralized model of providing clean energy solutions to rural, off-grid communities can be replicated in other mountainous regions of Tajikistan and beyond.

The empowerment of women as leaders in energy and environmental sustainability creates a multiplier effect, promoting further social and economic development.

Illiterate women have raised their technical skills on installing and maintaining solar devices.

40 women are asserting their right to take active roles in local decision-making, reducing isolation, and raising their social status.

Improves household sanitation needs, reduces indoor air pollution mostly affecting women and children.

Technical solutions

Kitchen Energy Transition for Women Around Tiko Mangrove

Description of the project

In Tiko, South-West Cameroon, over 90% of rural women rely on mangrove wood for cooking and fish smoking, exposing them to health risks and limiting their time for education and income-generating activities. Voice of Nature - VoNat - addresses these challenges by introducing an alternative, sustainable fuel, based on vegetable waste recycling. They are training 500 women to produce affordable, clean biofuel briquettes from local bio-waste. This initiative improves women's and children's respiratory health, increases household income, and alleviates women's labour burdens by reducing time spent gathering firewood, freeing up space for income-generating activities, and personal development.

Transformative Results

20% reduction in GHG emissions by switching to briquettes from mangrove wood.

Reduces mangrove deforestation by up to 80%, preserving this critical carbon sink.

Promotes circular economy through low-resource, self-sufficient bio-waste transformation.

Fostering women's leadership in climate resilient agriculture

Description of the project

Community Water Alliance supports climate vulnerable women farmers in Buhera, Zimbabwe, to adapt to extreme temperatures and droughts through access to irrigation and resilient agricultural practices. The project promotes gender equality by incorporating women into climate adaptation planning at the village level, focusing on strengthening their agricultural skills,

creating financial savings and credit cooperatives as well as access to the local markets. By providing solar-powered water pumps and irrigation systems and training female smallholder farmers in sustainable horticulture, the project enhances food security and climate resilience while promoting women's leadership in rural agriculture.

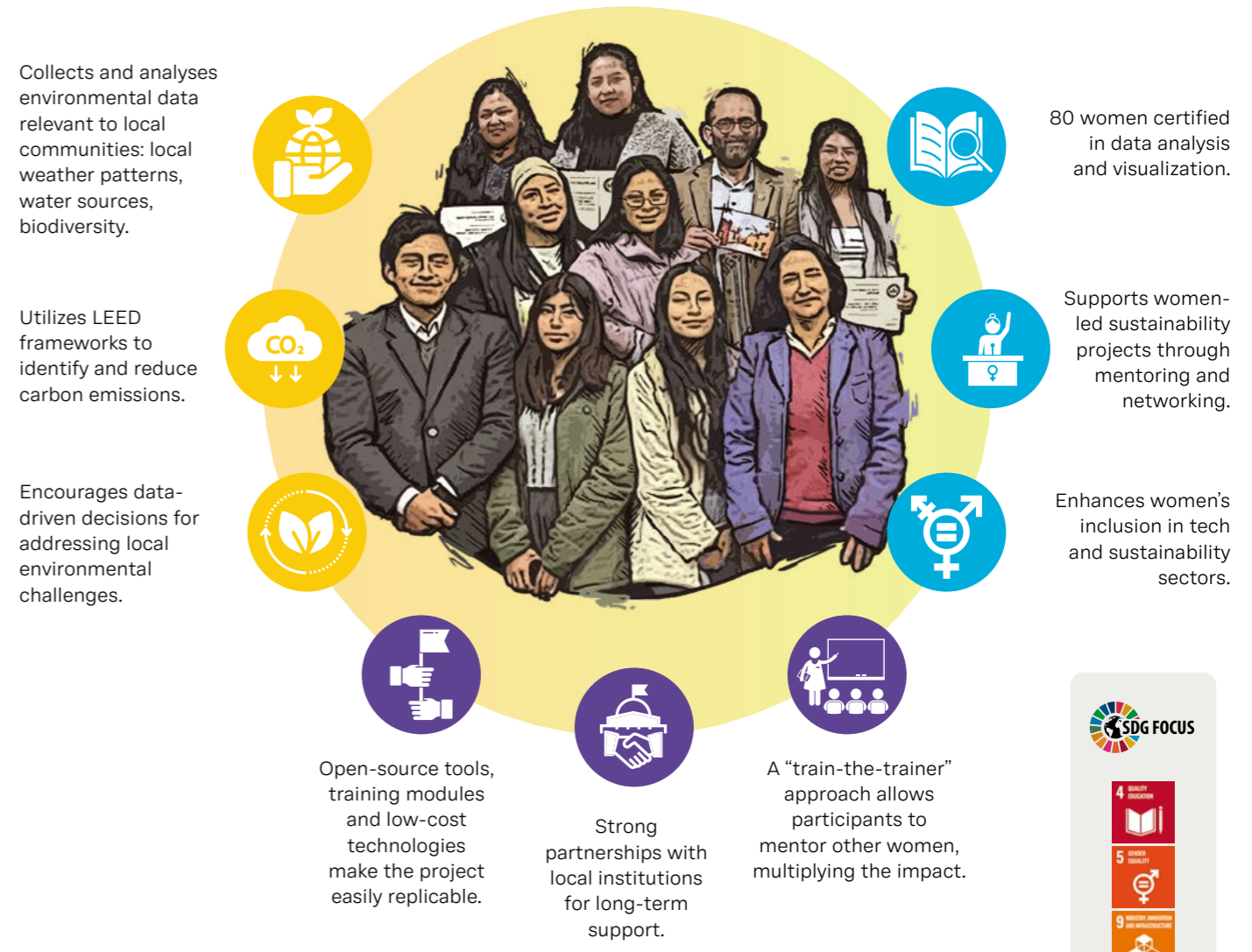
Women data scientists support the construction of climate resilient spaces

Description of the project

Data for Resilient Spaces strengthens women's skills for digital environmental data analysis in southern Peru. Participants learn data collection, analysis, and visualization techniques through practical projects using LEED - Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design - for communities, dashboard creation, and quantitative research. This includes workshops,

mentorship, conferences, and team-based data analysis. The project provided inputs to Arequipa municipality to optimize its waste collection system and calculate CO₂ emissions reduction. The goal is to train 500 women in data analysis and digitalization, supporting the inclusion of more women in the STEM sector in Peru.

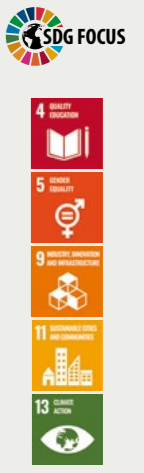

SWOP SIS: feminist fashion recycling

Description of the project

The SWOP SIS project is an eco-friendly fashion swapping digital platform that allows women to exchange clothing items from their wardrobes with curated pieces from a shared community wardrobe. Through “Dress to Express” events, which include fashion shows, mentorship with industry professionals, and workshops on fashion design and self-styling workshops the project promotes sustainable fashion, reduces textile waste, and fosters a community of eco-conscious individuals. This initiative has reached over 500 women, boosting their confidence and self-expression through feminist and sustainable fashion.

Transformative Results

Supports the circular economy by reusing and redistributing fashion items, decreasing overall resource consumption.

Reduces CO₂ emissions for each clothing swap.

Encourages sustainable consumption habits through educational workshops on eco-conscious fashion practices.



The digital platform can be expanded to other regions with local ambassadors facilitating community wardrobes.

Community engagement events, such as “Dress to Express,” can be replicated through partnerships with local organizations and government.

500 women are informed about the negative environmental impacts of fast fashion and acquired sustainable fashion practices.

Fosters economic independence by enabling women to save money through clothing swaps.

Women are involved in decision-making processes for project activities and serve as SWOP Sis Ambassadors.

COMPACT, social innovation for low-carbon construction

Description of the project

COMPACT is a social start-up for low-carbon construction using local materials. It addresses the booming use of GHG emitting concrete in Senegal. The founders, a female engineer, and a female entrepreneur, industrialized the production of Compressed Stabilized Earth Bricks (C.S.E.B.) that reduce cement use by 30 to 50%. They raised the technical skills of 20 local workers, and advocated towards governments, local authorities, design labs and architects to adapt standards in the building sector. Their first CSEB constructions serve women-led SMEs with a house for women fishers and small shops for an antique market. COMPACT employs workers living with disabilities, covering their medical care.

Transformative Results

Compressed Stabilized Earth Block (CSEB) reduces carbon emissions by 30-50% versus standard cement or concrete.

Reduces the use of toxic chemicals and promotes safe, eco-friendly buildings for sustainable cities.



Research & Development ensures continuous innovation, producing ready mixes for a large dissemination of CSEB technique.

Raising awareness in the workers' communities for the adoption of CSEB technique.

Collaborates with the government of Senegal to build 46 citizens houses using CSEB.

Mentoring program by women entrepreneurs guides the managerial decisions of COMPACT.

Safe, sustainable buildings address the needs of underserved women groups and SMEs.

Responsible company policy for employee medical care.

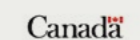

Dosy bikes: clean mobility for climate and gender justice

Description of the project

Dosy is a digital platform fostering easy access to electric scooter and bicycle riding for women in Egypt and the MENA Region. It reduces CO₂ emissions and air pollution by promoting eco-friendly transportation while breaking gender barriers. Dosy facilitates access to female biking instructors, vehicles, spare parts, maintenance and

self-defence services, for more than 10,000 women. This innovative digital start-up challenges deeply rooted social stereotypes by facilitating mobility freedom and creating new job opportunities for women as driving instructors or delivery riders. Dosy partners with local enterprises for scooter reuse and services, contributing to a local circular economy.

Transformative Results

Creating alternatives to fossil fuel-powered transportation lowers GHG emissions and improves air quality in urban areas.

Promoting active mobility improves public health and resilience to heatwaves.

Contributing to local circular economy by reducing the demand for fossil fuels and promoting vehicle reuse.



Plans to expand in other African countries, and other countries with dense urban traffic like Jordan and India.

Adding new digital services such as e-commerce and an app.

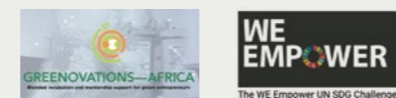

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Renewable Energy Communities for a gender-just transition

Description of the project

WECF and Milieukontakt are advancing decentralized renewable energy generation in Albania, contributing to national and European energy transition goals. Renewable Energy Communities (REC) promote local energy production, distribution, and storage, while addressing climate change, energy poverty, and social inclusion. Starting with a gender analysis,

the partners engage rural women, low-income households, youth, and policymakers. By promoting women's energy literacy and "prosumerism," the initiative empowers communities to participate in renewable energy projects. Policy recommendations focus on integrating RECs into the national energy system and enhancing gender-responsive citizens participation.

Transformative Results

Contributes to Albania's energy security by diversifying its electricity generation, that today depends to 90% on hydropower.

Supports Albania's commitment to the European Energy Community and EU accession, to diversify its energy sources and decarbonize its economy.

Citizens and local enterprises contribute to energy price stability, and climate mitigation.

Cooperating with decisionmakers, energy agencies, utility companies, energy associations, NGOs, international organizations, using a participatory approach.

Legal framework analysis to enable transition at national scale.

Effective communication strategy ensures broad awareness.



Gender analysis of Albania's energy sector, for a gender just energy transition.

Zág women defending earth and climate

Description of the project

The Zág Institute acts to save the endemic Araucaria tree, known as Zág, and preserve the Laklãnõ-Xokleng traditional knowledge in the Brazilian Atlantic Forest. The project fosters Indigenous Women's central role in restoring ancestral practices for biodiversity protection by giving them a coordinating role in conducting reforestation programs. They focus

on educating youth, reintroducing native tree species while removing invasive plants, promoting regenerative farming. Connected to international networks, Zág Institute actively promotes women's participation in regional and global governance. They also foster women's financial autonomy through handicraft and organic honey production.

Sanchay / CulTool: women's wisdom for climate resilient construction

Description of the project

The Sanchay/CulTool project by GRRID Corps in Jodhpur, India, leverages traditional knowledge on climate resilient construction practices, heat management, and water conservation. Women, as custodians of this wisdom, actively contributed to documenting their knowledge, which was integrated into the city's Heat Action Plan. The project aims to elevate women as climate leaders, preserve cultural heritage, and build climate resilience by rehabilitating traditional knowledge, and practices. This solution enables women to share their knowledge with schoolchildren through workshops showcasing the importance of cultural heritage in building a sustainable future.

Transformative Results

Documented traditional building methods that reduce the need for energy-intensive cooling solutions, lowering electricity consumption.

Support community climate resilience with self-sufficient, low-resource practices.

Using local materials, reducing resource extraction and carbon emissions.



Project outcomes can be easily shared and replicated in other communities.

Local authorities and stakeholders created the first Jodhpur Heat Action Plan to ensure wider adoption.

Knowledge-sharing sessions allow for the integration of local Indigenous knowledge.

Women recognized as knowledge holders and climate leaders: their expertise is integrated into local policies.

Women's rights are promoted by challenging gender norms.

Increased women's visibility and participation in community governance for climate solutions.

Textile upcycling to reduce menstrual poverty of internally displaced persons

Description of the project

TeamUpcyclers was launched by a Nigerian group of young women to address the interconnected challenges of economic disempowerment, poor waste management, period poverty, and climate change. By collecting and upcycling textile waste into reusable sanitary pads, TeamUpcyclers provide a sustainable solution to menstrual hygiene issues faced by displaced women and girls. The initiative promotes green skills and waste management education in schools and internally displaced persons (IDP) camps. Each year, TeamUpcyclers reaches over 8,000 individuals, 70% of whom are women, through climate education, hands-on skills training, and sustainable development awareness programs.

Transformative Results

Upcycled over 150 tons of textile and plastic waste annually, preventing waste from reaching landfills, thus reducing greenhouse gas emissions.

3,000 internally displaced persons (IDPs) and 50 individuals with disabilities (IWDs) were trained to manage waste and promote resource efficiency.

Training materials and techniques for waste management and upcycling are standardized and documented and can be shared.

Collaboration with over 30 NGOs and community organizations that established participatory workshops and feedback sessions.



500 women and girls received reusable sanitary pads, addressing menstrual hygiene needs in displaced and low-income communities.

Promotes gender equality by ensuring equitable access to training, resources, and economic opportunities for women and girls.

Increased women's social standing by encouraging them to lead training sessions and advocate for their rights.

Reduces the gendered burden of managing menstrual hygiene during climate-related displacement.

Partnerships with local NGOs and community organizations enhance the project's reach, enabling the distribution of reusable sanitary pads to more communities.

Women deploying waste upcycling for a local circular economy

Description of the project

The Waste Upcycle Training and Business Mentorship Program, launched by Development Impact Pathfinders Initiative, Devimpath, supports Indigenous women and girls in Abuja, Nigeria, by teaching them sustainable waste management practices, and business skills. This project enables participants to upcycle materials like tires, plastic

bottles, and fabrics into sellable products such as interior décor, furniture, and vases. Following the pilot training, 25 more women have been trained through a “replicate yourself” model initiated to motivate the participants to each train one more woman on the skills they have learned.

Transformative Results

Reduces flood risks and environmental hazards by preventing waste from clogging drainage systems and water bodies.



Mitigates greenhouse gas emissions by reducing the burning of solid waste.



Encourages the adoption of circular economy principles by transforming waste into valuable products.



The model “replicate yourself” encourages participants to train others in their communities, expanding the outreach.



The project’s alignment with local needs ensures community ownership for long-term success.



By integrating waste management with economic empowerment, the program responds to both environmental and social challenges.



Indigenous women have gained business skills to run and manage a small business, increasing income and decision-making.



Enhances women’s decision-making power in their households by increasing their economic contributions.



Fosters collaboration and knowledge-sharing among women, strengthening social cohesion and community support networks.

Interactive theater for gender and climate justice

Description of the project

The Young Changemakers’ initiative uses participatory theatre performances to raise awareness about climate vulnerability and gender, and drive change in communities across Faisalabad and Lahore, Pakistan. The project engages women, youth, and marginalized groups in discussions

on gender equality and climate justice. Through workshops, advocacy campaigns, and interactive shows, the project fosters community-driven environmental solutions, strengthens social cohesion, and amplifies voices for gender-responsive climate action.

Transformative Results

Facilitating 20 community-driven climate solutions, including tree planting and water conservation efforts.



50 theatre performances on climate have helped reach over 5,000 community members.



Communities adopted local adaptation strategies like rainwater harvesting and organic farming.



Train-the-trainer model enables local volunteers to replicate theatre performances and workshops in their communities.



Community-driven script development and performance execution ensure local ownership.



Addresses cross-cutting issues such as biodiversity loss, food security, and social protection.



300 women and youth trained in theatre arts and climate advocacy, gained skills for leadership and community engagement.



Women and marginalized groups find supportive spaces to advocate for their rights in climate action.



Messages raise awareness on the intersection between gender and climate justice.

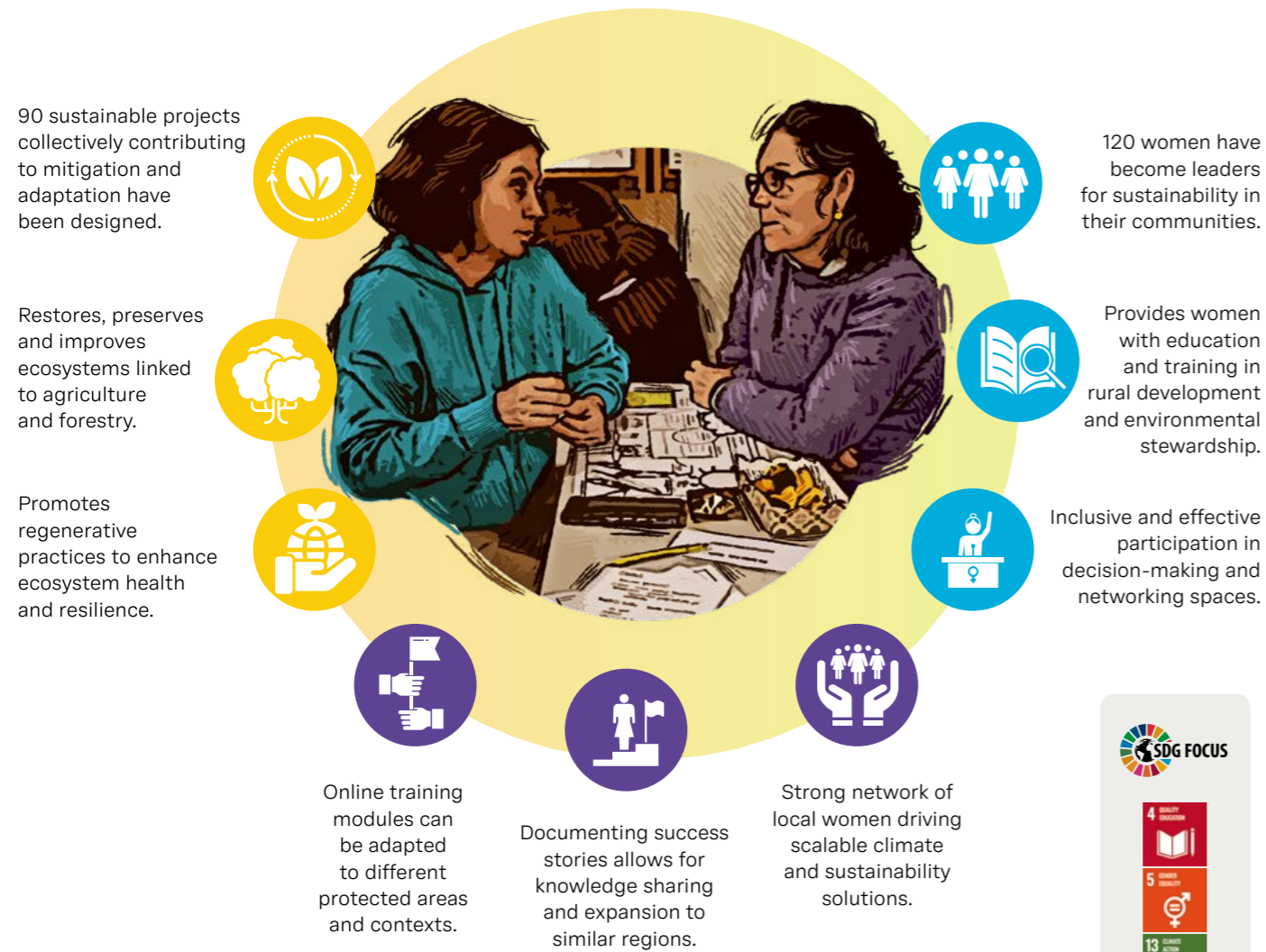


Guardians of Nature network

Description of the project

This network launched by the Association for Sustainable Consumption and Circular Economy (BasN) responds to climate challenges and promotes environmental sustainability across 8 protected areas in Portugal. By engaging 500 women and training 120 of them in permaculture, agroforestry, ecosystem recovery, and biodiversity conservation the association contributed to the design and implementation of 90 sustainable projects that are well integrated in their territory, enabling local communities to care for their natural heritage. The network actively contributes to the priorities defined in the EU Rural Development Strategy and the National Forestry Strategy.

Women mobilized for the climate resilience of Diaoulé territory

Description of the project

In the arid territory of Fatick, Senegal, the Diaoulé women's association is working to reforest, regenerate soil and restore degraded ecosystems. They created 9 tree-nurseries that can produce 300,000 seedlings a year, launched an agroecological school farm, and promoted the adoption of drip-irrigation systems and organic compost. All actions are initiated, planned and developed by the 200 women involved in the project, who benefit from technical training, best-practice exchange sessions and access to decision making. Local authorities are also involved at every step of the programme.

Awesome Blossoms: empowering women and girls to ensure a sustainable future

Description of the project

Awesome Blossoms is an initiative by the community-based organization Safe Spaces that transforms urban farming in the Mathare informal settlement, Nairobi. With 500 organic, water-efficient gardens, the project empowers 75 women and supports girls' education through partnerships with three local primary schools. Awesome Blossoms provides nutritious and organic vegetables grown with minimal water and land, fosters environmental education, and promotes women's micro-entrepreneurship. Having surpassed initial goals, the project now aims to acquire land for vertical farming systems, further enhancing sustainability and impact.

Transformative Results



500 hydroponic gardens planted in 3 school farms to grow organic, nutritious vegetables for school lunches and sales, educating pupils.

45 peer educators trained in organic farming, sales/marketing, organizational skills.

75 community women micro-entrepreneurs trained in organic farming, financial management, and sales.

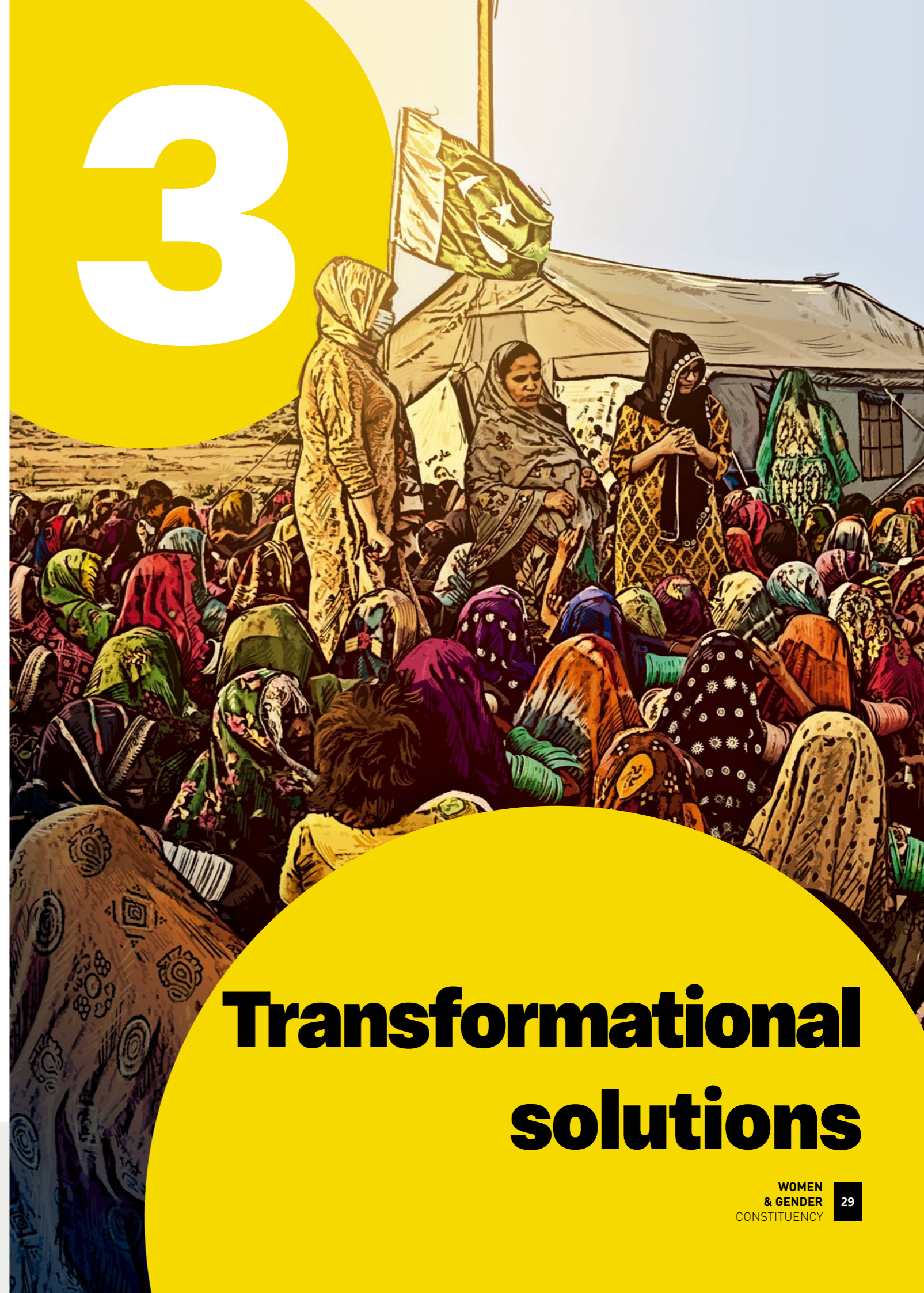

SheCures: sustainable menstrual hygiene solutions

Description of the project

The social enterprise SheCures Sanitary Product, based in Sierra Leone, promotes sexual and reproductive health for adolescents by providing them with safe, affordable, and reusable sanitary products. SheCures also conducts menstrual health education for girls and women, including persons with disabilities and the LGBTQ+ community. They trained

75 girls as Community Ambassadors to ensure their project is locally driven and organized workshops with product users to develop new initiatives, products, and services that are culturally appropriate, accessible, and effective. Youth participants are mobilised to engage with communities and authorities to address the issue of plastic pollution.

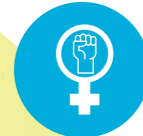

Since 2017 Girls Leaders Forum Rwanda empowers girls and boys from universities and communities as climate actors through leadership workshops and mentorship, community engagement, climate resilient practices training, and policy advocacy. Activities include promoting solar powered irrigation, organic farming based on indigenous

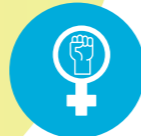

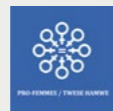

Women-led waste management with dignity

Description of the project

SWaCH Pune Cooperative Society integrates informal waste pickers, predominantly women from marginalized castes in India, into the formal waste management system. Formed in partnership with Pune's municipality, SWaCH provides door-to-door waste collection services while giving agency to women through dignified, stable work. Serving

over 4 million residents, the cooperative collects 1,400 tons of waste daily, recycling over 220 tons and composting 18 tons. By ensuring safer working conditions for women and leveraging their expertise, SWaCH promotes a circular economy while fostering social equity, environmental sustainability, and economic independence for women waste pickers.

Transformative Results

Diverts 220 tons of dry waste daily from landfills, significantly reducing carbon emissions.



Promotes source segregation with 98% of Pune's households participating.



Facilitates in-situ composting of 18 tons of organic waste daily.



Ensures women's leadership, with 70% of cooperative members being women, and a nearly 100% women-led board.



Fosters gender equity in the recycling sector by enabling women to take on decision-making roles in cooperative scrap trading centres.



2,724 women waste pickers, many widowed or single mothers, gained stable incomes and decent working conditions.

The cooperative's success provides evidence to motivate municipalities to enhance citizen participation in waste management.



The partnership between waste pickers and local municipalities provides a global model for formalizing waste management systems.

Seeds of Change: Ogiek Indigenous women acting for resilience

Description of the project

Koibatek Ogiek Women and Youth Network, was founded to enhance the resilience of Indigenous Ogiek women by promoting sustainable agricultural practices and seed-saving techniques. "Seeds of Change" strengthens the knowledge of Ogiek women on agroecological farming, Indigenous plant cultivation, and responsible land management. It

also supports ecosystem-based income generation by distributing honeytree seedlings for beekeeping and establishing kitchen gardens. The organization's transformational leader, Judy Kipkenda, has lobbied to reform seed-exchange laws that disadvantage Indigenous communities across six counties of the Rift Valley region in Kenya.

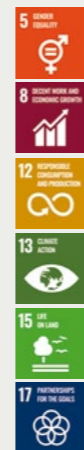

Description of the project

In South Kivu Province, Democratic Republic of Congo, decades of conflict and deforestation have threatened Indigenous Pygmy communities and the Itombwe Rainforest, the world's second-largest tropical rainforest. Since 2014, the WECAN forest program, led by women, has tackled climate

protection, ecosystem restoration, and community resilience. Through traditional ecological knowledge, reforestation, food sovereignty, and women's leadership, the program has secured women's land rights, regenerated forests, protected 1.6 million acres of old-growth forest, and strengthened community resilience.
